Recently, we have been working to remodel certain aspects of the school so that the children have an impiring environment to learn in and to be proud of. Our most recent refurbishment has been our school hall. For us, the school hall is at the heart of our school and is a place where we can come together as a St Gregory's family. It is also a place in which we can come together to worship God, reflect upon the beauty of life and celebrate our successes. When we thought about the uses of our hall, another person also came to mind — Fr Bob! He was also the heart of our school and brought us all together for many of the same reasons as detailed above. Therefore, as a tribute to Fr Bob and reminder of his lasting legacy our hall will now be known as the 'Robert Wright Hall'. It will be our special way of remembering him at St Gregory's.

Many of our staff, children and families were eager to do something special to remember Fr Bob, and therefore we are designing a special piece of artwork, which will be installed within the hall in memory of him. When time allows, we hope that many of you will join us for a special Mass to bless the hall - you are of course always welcome to join us at St Gregory's.

6 KEEPING A SECRET. MARK. 1:40-45.

It is hard to keep a secret especially when a really good, dramatic, unusual and exciting story is involved. We can sympathise with the man in today's Gospel story. He was a leper, which was one of the worst fates that could befall a person in first-century Palestine. The disease was not only a debilitating illness, it was also a social stigma. It was generally regarded as a sign of disfavour with God and to be highly contagious. Its victims were condemned to a life of knellness. By law they were ostracised from society, isolated from family and friends, and could mingle with no one but fellow lepers.

Such was the life of the man in our story, until he met Jesus. From that moment he was cured of his disease and enabled once more to be accepted in the community. But then we find a curious thing. After Jesus had healed him, He gave him strict instructions not to tell anyone what had happened.

He must have found this hard. He had been separated from his family, we don't know for how long, possibly several years. Now he could go back to his family, his work, his friends; but he was to remain silent about how he had been healed and by whom. The man was unable to keep such a secret. He was so happy, he had to tell everyone.

We are not surprised at that. Could we have kept it a secret? We are curious to know why Jesus gave him that instruction. All through the New Testament we are commanded to be witnesses; encouraged to speak up, to tell others what Christ has done in our lives. Yet here is a man whom Jesus had blessed beyond measure and he is under orders to remain silent. Why is this?

Part of the reason is fairly obvious. Mark tells us that after the man had made his story public, Jesus could no longer openly enter the towns of that region. Instead it was necessary for Him to remain in desert places and deal with people who came to Him. The man's story had obviously generated so much excitement that the crowds became virtually unmanageable whenever it became known that Jesus was in town. This was not the kind of publicity that He needed or wanted. He did not want over-excited and uncommitted people to be His followers. He wanted people to have a deep personal relationship with God. He was looking for serious followers who had counted the cost and would be still faithful after the initial excitement had faded. This man's testimony was actually more of a hindrance than a help. Jesus wanted him to keep the matter a secret between the two of them.

But I think there was more to it than that. It had something to do with the man himself. When Jesus told him to remain silent it was not simply to protect Himself from the alemands of the crowd, it was intended as a ministry to the man himself. Silence was one of the things he needed most. There are times when we need the same thing. Every life should have a secret side. Any life that doesn't have it is shallow and empty.

In contrast, we can think of Mary, the mother of Jesus. She, too, had a remarkable experience. The angel Gabriel announced to her that she was to give birth to the Son of God. Nothing like that had ever happened before. Her mind must have been racing and her heart bursting with the news. But can you imagine Mary going out and making her story public, telling it to anyone she happened to meet in the street? She went first to her cousin, Elizabeth, whose life had also been touched by God. The two of them spent the next three months talking, thinking, wondering and trying to understand what God had done to them. Then after the birth of her Son Mary treasured all these things and pondered them in her heart.

Something like that could have happened and should have happened in the life of the man in our story. What he needed most was not to talk but to think. Later on it might have been right to talk, but first he needed something besides a sensational story to tell. We wonder whether he ever came to grips with the real issues. Who was this Man who had healed him? Why did He do it? How would he handle thin new lease of life? Those were the key questions. Unless he faced them squarely and answered them honestly, then his miracle, as wonderful as it was, never made much difference. A healthy body does not necessarily guarantee effective living.

The same thing applies to us, whether we have ever experienced a miraculous healing or not. Every day in many ways God touches our lives, just as surely as Jesus touched that lonely leper. The problem is that we are often too busy to realise it. I am sure that Jesus had that in mind when He told this man to remain silent. He wanted him to look upon this miracle as a spiritual healing and not just a physical healing. Like the leper we too need to ponder and reflect on what God does for us every day in our lives. Mary did this and she can be our example.

Question - When are we aware in our lives of God as "more powerful than I am?"

Question - What will we do this week to stand down and give God the centre stage?
