(THE JESUS COMMUNITY)

CHRIST CAME TO DISTURB THE COMFORTABLE MK. 1:21-28.

Jesus was a very skilful public speaker. People were profoundly affected both by the things He said and the way that He said them. We see this in today's Gospel. Mark doesn't tell us a single word that Jesus spoke. Instead he deals with the reaction of His listeners. Most of the people were favourably impressed. 'He spoke unlike the scribes and taught with authority.' But one man was plainly offended. He shouted at Jesus, "What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us?" Mark explains his behaviour by saying he "was possessed by an unclean spirit." At least we can give the man the credit for taking Jesus seriously. He saw Jesus as a threat to his present way of living.

We tend to forget what a disturbing presence Jesus was. Take a casual stroll through the pages of the New Testament, and you will meet all sorts of people whose lives were disrupted by His influence. Even before His birth, He drastically altered the plans of Mary and Joseph. While a baby, He evoked the anger of a jealous and brutal king. As a grown man, He made one brief trip to the country of the Gerasenes, on the eastern shore of the Sea of Galilee, where He cast out of one man a legion of devils into a herd of pigs and the locals begged Him to leave their district. Zachaeus was probably the wealthiest man in Jericho, until He opened the doors of his home and his heart to Jesus. That brief visit cost him most of his fortune. He ended by giving half to the poor and paying restitution fourfold.

Nicodemus had reached the pinnacle of His career. He was a teacher of Israel and a member of the Sanhedrin court. Then he had a private meeting with Jesus. From that moment he was a troubled man, his conscience pulling in one direction and His career in another. He wanted to take an open stand for Jesus, but lacked the courage to endure the scorn of his peers. Joseph of Arimathea had a similar experience. He was a rich man, planning to live out his days in ease and comfort. Then somehow, he fell under the spell of Jesus. He was torn between his prestige and his convictions. John tells us that, 'he was a disciple of Jesus, but secretly for fear of the Jesus.'

After the crucifixion Jesus went on disturbing people's lives. Saul of Tarsus was a solid member of the establishment, regarded for his scholarship and admired for his zeal. A promising future stretched out in front of him. Then he met Jesus on the road to Damascus and everything changed. He became a hated and a hunted man. He might have died in bed with his head on a pillow, if Christ had left him alone. But according to a tradition, he died in Rome, with his head on a chopping block!

Over a thousand years later look what Jesus did to Francis of Assisi. He was the son of a rich cloth merchant, heir to great wealth. Then Christ challenged him and he stripped himself of his fortune and lived the life of a poor man. That man in the synagogue at Capernaum was right. He may have been possessed but he was aware that involvement with Christ would mean radical changes in his life. The rest of the crowd were, 'deeply impressed by what Jesus said.' We can believe that, but we are not told whether they did anything about it. As far as we know only one person was changed in the synagogue that day. It was the man who was possessed and felt threatened by Jesus.

What about us? Would we be like that man or the crowd? One of the easiest and the most common things in the world is to be favourably impressed with the teachings of Christ. We like to applaud the things that He said, but to take them to heart and apply them to life is quite another matter. The thought of changing our lives can be frightening. Here we join the company of the man who wanted Christ to leave Him alone.

This man was possessed. We are not at home with the idea of demon possession. It is something that belongs to another time and place. But perhaps, it is not as strange as at first it might seem. We sometimes speak of having an unforgiving spirit, or a selfish attitude, or a prejudiced mind. They certainly make us 'possessed,' in the sense that they dominate our lives. We would be better off without them, but they are not easy to overcome. They have virtually become a part of us. The experience of this man differs from ours in at least one way. Without prior consent or consultation, Jesus cast out the unclean spirit, and made the man whole. Jesus doesn't work with us like that. He makes no corrections in our lives, against our will. But if we allow Him, He will most certainly get rid of those things that separate us from Him.

So to be threatened by Jesus is not a bad thing. It simply means taking Him seriously. If we do, it will be the first step on the road to a better way of living.
